The Saugatuck-Douglas District Library is pleased toannounce the availability of a new research database, specifically for thebusiness community. ReferenceUSA, a product of Infogroup, contains information on 49 million U.S. businesses and 274 million consumers. Users can search byindustry type, geographic area as well as many other criteria.

Reference USA is a great tool for building mailing lists, identifying new prospects and suppliers, or locating long-lost friends and relatives. Job seekers will benefit from the detailed company descriptions as well as the 2.5 million job listings and internship opportunities. The database is available to all users from within the Library. Saugatuck-Douglas card-holders have the ability to access the resource remotely through the library's website.

The Library has an 8 1/2" wide laminating machine, which is available for public use. Cost is only 50 cents per foot.


